ADVENT - PREPARING FOR EMMANUEL

Advent is the season of the Church year that call us to prepare for the



celebration of the Great Feast of eh Nativity of Jesus Christ. Advent began on November 15 and continues through Christmas Eve, December 24. During Advent we ae challenged to think more seriously about our relationship with our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ, Who took on our humanity to reveal God's love for us.

REJOICE, O ISAIAH! A virgin is with Child, and bear a son, and shall call Him Emmanuel – God with us! With these words, the Old Testament Prophet Isaiah anticipated the coming of the Savior. These words embody the longings, hopes, and desires of God's people as they prepared to receive the One who come to grant them new life.

During Advent we anticipate and prepare for the celebration of the Birth of the Savior and the joy we experience on the Feast oof Christmas depends on how well we have prepared ourselves to receive Him.

We spend a great deal of time getting ready for Christmas.in shopping, decorating and menu planning. Important as these matters are, *our spiritual preparation is critical if we are to catch the true Christmas spirit*.

INCREASED PRAYER

Prayer is communication with God. Not only should we pray when we need help in our daily lives, but we should pray to thank and glorify God for the many blessings He has given us. "Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, in everything give thanks; for tis is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you." (Philippians 5:16-18). During Advent, we should especially reflect on the gift of eternal life made possible by the Birth of Jesus Christ.

FASTING

When we fast, we should not only avoid certain foods and their quantity, but we should also avoid anything and everything which tends to control us. Fasting is *doing without* those things which are not essential for our lives. Fasting, by cleansing our bodies helps to clear our minds, enabling us to gain control once again of those things which so often control us.

REPENTANCE

Repentance is the conscious effort to change our lives and to turn things around from those things which create barriers between us, God, and others.

During Advent we are offered the opportunity to devote time to self-reflection, to reassess our relationships with God and with others, and to be reconciled and reunited with those from whom we have grown apart. Our thoughts should turn to the miracle of God's love and forgiveness which our Lord proclaims and to the new life He gives.

HELPING OTHERS

While we pray and fast and repent, it is equally important to share or time, our talent and treasures with others, the poor, the needy, the hungry and especially the lonely. Advent should bring us together, uniting us around the new born King – His Life, His message, His death and resurrection as the King of Glory.

A BLESSED THANKSGIVING DAY

Count your blessings instead of your crosses.

Count your gains instead your losses.

Count your joys instead of your woes.

Count your friends instead of your foes

Count your smiles instead of your tears.

Count your courage instead of your fears.

Count your full years instead of your lean.

Count your kind deeds instead of your mean

Count your health instead of your wealth.

Count on God instead of yourself.

THE ADVENT WREATH

To help in our preparation during the Fast, we have an Advent Wreath in Church. The Wreath, made of evergreens, will have six candles on it – one for each week in Advent.

Today, Sunday, November 22^{nd} , along with special prayers, we will light the **second candle** on the Advent Wreath – as we prepare to empty ourselves in repentance and open our hearts to receive Christ the Light of the World into our hearts.

The people who walked in darkness have seen a great Light.

For those who dwell in the land of the shadow of death, a Light is risen.

For unto us a Child is born; unto us a Son is given.

And of His peace there shall be no end. Isaiah 9:2,6

THE CHRISTMAS CANON

On November 21st, the Feast of Mary's Entrance into the Temple as a child, is celebrated. This Feast is filled with important spiritual significance for us the believers. The main theme of Mary's entrance into the Temple is the fact that she enters into the Temple to become the *LIVING TEMPLE OF GOD*, thus inaugurating the New Testament in which are fulfilled the prophecies of the Old Testament that "THE DWELLING PLACE OF GOD IS WITH MAN" and that the human person is the sole proper dwelling place of the Divine Presence.

With the celebration of the Feast of Mary's Entrance into the Temple, we begin to sing the Irmos from the Matins of Christmas:

Christ is born; Glorify Him!
Christ is on earth; be exalted!
Sing to the Lord, all the earth!
And praise Him in gladness, O people,
for He has been glorified!

- 2) All must wear masks in church (disposable masks are provided in the vestibule).
- 3) Sanitize your hands before entering the church (sanitizer is located in the vestibule).
- 4) All are required to keep 6 feet social distancing. Pews are marked for available and not available seating.

5) Please...THERE WILL BE NO GATHERING IN THE VESTIBULE, OFFICE OR PARISH HALL

So sorry to say... but we cannot kiss the icons, cross, chalice, gospel book, and/or Father's hand.
