Archpastoral Message of His Beatitude, Metropolitan Tikhon Pascha 2021

Today the Myrrhbearing Women arrive at the tomb and, seeing the angel, hear from him the joyous message that the Lord has risen. When they leave the tomb, running to tell the Apostles the news, Christ Himself suddenly appears to them and greets them with a single word: "Rejoice!" (Mt 28:9).

On this bright day, as we celebrate this glorious feast of feasts, this supreme festival of festivals, the Resurrection of Christ, I in turn extend our Lord's greeting and say to you all: "Rejoice!"
Our Lord Jesus Christ has revealed Himself to us through His Death and Resurrection. He has won the victory for us over seemingly meaningless death by His all-meaningful Death, and we in turn celebrate with exceeding joy. Death no longer stings and hell has no victory, for its gates are smashed and its prisoners are freed. The Resurrection of Christ has brought eternal life to all.

Through the Resurrection, we rejoice—in spite of our sins, hardheartedness, and lack of forgiveness. For we know that God promised

through Jeremiah: "I will forgive their iniquity, and I will remember their sin no more" (Jer 31:34).

Through the Resurrection, we rejoice—in spite of our doubts, worries, and anxieties. For as was guaranteed to us through Zephaniah: "No one shall make them afraid... The King of Israel, the Lord, is in your midst; you shall see disaster no more!" (Zeph 3:13, 15). Through the Resurrection, we rejoice—in spite of the difficulties, trials, and struggles that we have faced, and always will face, in the brief span of our earthly lives. For Christ Himself has promised: "Lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age. Amen!" (Mt 28:20).

My brothers and sisters in the Lord: "Rejoice!"
Our sins are forgiven, our anxieties cease, and our temporary sufferings are given meaning through the Resurrection of the One who grants us eternal life. And while this eternal life is only fully manifest in the age to come, it is ours to experience joyfully even now.

May we celebrate the Feast of the Resurrection in joy and love. From this day forward, may we never cease exulting in the Lord.

Come and receive the light from the Unwaning Light, and glorify Christ, Who is risen from the dead!

Sunday morning dawned like any other Sunday morning in Jerusalem. The Sabbath was over and it was back to life.

For Jesus' disciples, however, this morning was the continuation of a horrible nightmare. Jesus' body lay buried in a rock-hewn tomb outside the city. It had been placed there, hastily, Friday night. Because of the proximity of the Sabbath, Jewish burial customs had to be postponed.

Very early on that Sunday morning the women came to the tomb, carrying the spices they had prepared. They found the stone rolled away from the entrance of

the tomb, so they went in; but they did not find the Body of the Lord Jesus. They stood there puzzled about this, when suddenly two men in bright shining clothes stood by them. Full of fear, the women bowed to the ground, as the men said to them, 'Why are you looking among the dead for One Who is alive? He has risen; He is not here.'

No more thrilling words can be imagined than those of the angel to the women at the tomb: "He is risen – He is not here."

These words signal the dawn of a new glorious day.

Announcing the Resurrection of Christ, the angel proclaims the victory of Christ, the new Adam, over the death to which mankind had been sold by the old Adam

Together with our first parents we feel the hand of the Lord grasping us and lifting us out of the dark sleep and with joyous voices we can now sing:

Christ is risen from the dead, trampling death by death, and upon those in the tombs bestowing life.

May this Holy Pascha be filled with the Light and the Peace and the Joy of our Risen Lord and Savior Jesus Christ for you and your family.

BLESSING OF THE ARTOS

Following the Midnight Service of Pascha, the **ARTOS** will be blessed. The Artos is a Paschal Bread and bears on it the Icon of the Resurrection. In the Old Covenant the Jews commemorated the Passover from bondage in Egypt by sacrificing a Passover Lamb.

Christ is our Passover Lamb Who has freed us from the bondage of sin and death. The Artos is offered and blessed on Holy Pascha and symbolizes the Angelic Bread, the Bread of Eternal Life; namely our Lord Jesus Christ. We will break the Bread and partake of it on the eighth of Pascha, St. Thomas Sunday.

BLESSING OF THE RED EGGS

Father Don will bless The red eggs and then and distribute them to everyone in Church.

RED EGGS symbolize the New Life in the Risen Christ granted to us thorough His Precious Blood shed on the Cross, As Father presents each one of us with a red egg, he will greet us with "Christ is Risen" and we respond "Indeed, He is Risen"
