

His Beatitude Metropolitan Tikhon Makes Urgent Financial Appeal for Ukrainian Refugee Relief

Dear beloved children in the Lord,

It is with profound pain and sorrow that we see the situation unfolding in Ukraine. The invasion of Russian troops has already caused death and destruction in many areas of the country and, as the battle progresses, the human cost continues to rise. It is heartbreaking to see the images of destroyed buildings, homes, and traffic jams as refugees flee the cities for their safety.

As Orthodox Christians we are expected to help those who are suffering and give comfort to the afflicted. The Apostle James asks us "If a brother or sister is ill-clad and in lack of daily food, and one of you says to them, 'Go in peace, be warmed and filled,' without giving them the things needed for the body, what does it profit?" (Jas. 2:16). We cannot turn a blind eye to the material needs of our suffering brothers and sisters in Christ.


Therefore, I am making a special appeal for donations from the individual parishioners of the Orthodox Church in America from February 28th through March 7th. These donations will be collected by the Orthodox Church in America and sent on to ELEOS, the humanitarian agency of the Polish Orthodox Church, and registered with the Polish government, who is dealing directly with the unfolding refugee crisis and needs support as soon as possible. Donations will go towards refugee relief, their housing, and meeting basic needs.

This collaboration is being done with the blessing of His Beatitude Metropolitan Sawa of the Polish Orthodox Church. The Orthodox Church in America and the Polish Orthodox Church have long historical ties and these ties have enabled this collaboration to come together so quickly. Donations can be made at oca.org/relief.

Furthermore, I again ask that fervent prayers be made for a swift end to this senseless violence. As we approach the beginning of Lent, we will soon hear the words of the Psalmist at the Presanctified Liturgy: "Behold, how good and pleasant it is when brothers dwell in unity. It is like the precious oil upon the head running down upon the beard, the beard of Aaron, running down on the collar of his robes. It is like the dew of Hermon which falls on the mountains of Zion. For the Lord has commanded the blessing, life for evermore!" (Ps. 132).

I pray that we, and all Orthodox Christians around the world, aspire to live according to these words.

THE LENTEN SPRING - Father Thomas Hopko

People feel unhappy and they don't know why. They feel that something is wrong, but they can't put their finger on what. They feel uneasy in the world, confused and frustrated, alienated and estranged, and they can't explain it. They have everything and yet they want more and when they get it, they are still left empty and dissatisfied. They want happiness and peace, and nothing seems to bring it. They want fulfillment, and it never seems to come. Everything is fine, and yet everything is wrong. In America this is almost a national disease. It is covered over by frantic activity and endless running around. It is buried in activities and events. It is drowned out by television programs and games. But when the movement stops, and the dial is turned off and everything is guiet...then the dead sets in, and the meaninglessness of it all, and the boredom and the fear. Why is this so? Because, the Church tells us, we are really not at home. We are in exile. We are alienated and estranged from or true country. We are not with God our Father in the land of the living. We are spiritually sick. And some of us are already dead.

Our hearts are made for God, St. Augustine has said, and we will be forever restless until we rest in Him. Our lives ae made for God, and w will be unfulfilled and dissatisfied and frustrated until we go to Him. All of God's creatures, as Francis Thompson said in his poem *The Hound of Heaven*, are His "loyal betrayers." They do not satisfy His children and cannot bring them peace. He alone can do that, because He alone is our home. And we are His. The Lenten season is the time for our conscious return to our true home. It is the time set aside for us to come to ourselves and to get up and go to the divine reality to which we belong.

Prepare for Pascha by Praying the Psalms!



The Goal

To draw nearer to Christ and one another during this Lenten Fast by praying the Psalms together as a community, as we journey together toward holy Pascha.

How It Works

The Orthodox Church has divided the book of Psalms into 20 sections. In our St. Elia prayer group, we will all be praying a new section each day throughout the 40 days of the fast, beginning on March 7, so that we all will pray through the entire book of Psalms *twice* during the course of the fast.

As we all join together in prayer, we can use this opportunity to pray for one another, for our parish, and for any special intentions that any of us may have by sharing prayer requests with one another via email.

What You Need

Nothing more than a Bible and a little bit of time to set aside each day.

How Do I Join?

Go to http://saintelia.com/news/lenten-prayergroup/ and fill in the online form. Shortly before Great Lent begins, an email will be sent out with a schedule of which Psalms to pray each day, and the names of everyone else who is participating in the prayer group, so that we can remember one another in our daily prayers.

PANDEMIC GUIDELINES

Since the beginning of the <u>Covid-19</u>
<u>Pandemic</u> we have been taking every
PRECAUTION to protect the health and
well-bring of all our people.
In accordance with the CDC St. Elia Parish
will follow these directives:

- 1)If you are sick and/or exhibit coronavirus symptoms, you must refrain from attending services.
- 2)The CDC recommends masking while indoors if you are unvaccinated, sanitizing your hands and to maintain social distancing.
- 3) The kissing of Icons, the Cross, the Gospel Book, the Chalice and the priest's hand when receiving the blessing is permitted if you are comfortable doing so.
- 4) The sanitizer and masks are available in the vestibule for your convenience

The Pretzel

A traditional means of reminding us that it is Lent are the Lenten foods. Thus, even at our meals, we are reminded that prayer and penance should be practiced during these days.

Perhaps, the easiest Lenten food to serve every member of the family is the **pretzel...**It sounds surprising, but the pretzel has a deep spiritual meaning for Lent. In fact, it was the ancient Christian Lenten Bread as far back as the fifth century. In the Church of that century, as today, the Lenten Fast consisted of no milk, no butter, no cheese, no eggs, and, of course, no meat. So, they made small breads of water, flour and salt – mainly for the children

To **remind** themselves that Lent was a time of prayer, they shaped these breads in forms of arms crossed on the breast in prayer, as we do when we approach the Holy Chalice to receive Holy Communion. Therefore, they called these breads "little arms" or "bracellae" in Latin. From the Latin word, the German people coined the word "bretzel" which is the basis of our word pretzel.

Thus the pretzel is a most appropriate food symbol for Lent: it shows the form of the arms crossed in prayer, reminding us that Lent is a time of **PRAYER**. It consists only of water and flour, thus announcing to us that Lent is a time of **FASTING**. **Prayer and Fasting are the watch words of Great Lent**. **Let us enter into the joy of the Lenten Spring**.
