SUNDAY SCRIPTURE READINGS

Epistle: 2 Timothy 3:10-15

But you have carefully followed my doctrine, manner of life, purpose, faith, longsuffering, love, perseverance, persecutions, afflictions, which happened to me at Antioch, at Iconium, at Lystra—what persecutions I endured. And out of *them* all the Lord delivered me. Yes, and all who desire to live godly in Christ Jesus will suffer persecution. But evil men and impostors will grow worse and worse, deceiving and being deceived. But you must continue in the things which you have learned and been assured of, knowing from whom you have learned *them*, and that from childhood you have known the Holy Scriptures, which are able to make you wise for salvation through faith which is in Christ Jesus.

Gospel: Luke 18:10-14

"Two men went up to the temple to pray, one a Pharisee and the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood and prayed thus with himself, 'God, I thank You that I am not like other men—extortioners, unjust, adulterers, or even as this tax collector. I fast twice a week; I give tithes of all that I possess.' And the tax collector, standing afar off, would not so much as raise *his* eyes to heaven, but beat his breast, saying, 'God, be merciful to me a sinner!' I tell you, this man went down to his house justified *rather* than the other; for everyone who exalts himself will humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted."

Sunday of the Publican and Pharisee Beginning of the Lenten Triodion

Commemorated on February 5



The Sunday after the Sunday of Zacchaeus is devoted to the Publican and the Pharisee. At Vespers the night before, the *Triodion* (the liturgical book used in the services of Great Lent) begins.


Two men went to the Temple to pray. One was a Pharisee who scrupulously observed the requirements of religion: he prayed, fasted, and contributed money to the Temple. These are very good things, and should be imitated by anyone who loves God. We who may not fulfill these requirements as well as the Pharisee did should not feel entitled to criticize him for being faithful. His sin was in looking down on the Publican and feeling justified because of his external religious observances.

The second man was a Publican, a tax-collector who was despised by the people. He, however, displayed humility, and this humility justified him before God (Luke 18:14).

The lesson to be learned is that we possess neither the Pharisee's religious piety, nor the Publican's repentance, through which we can be saved. We are called to see ourselves as we really are in the light of Christ's teaching, asking Him to be merciful to us, deliver us from sin, and to lead us on the path of salvation.

Two weeks before the beginning of the Fast, as part of our preparation for Great Lent, Holy Week, and Pascha, the Church prescribes the reading of Saint Mark's Gospel. From Monday to Friday the focus is on the end times, and the Savior's death and burial.

THE JESUS PRAYER

LORD JESUS CHRIST, SON OF GOD, HAVE MERCY ON ME A SINNER

United to Jesus through Holy Baptism, we are called and given the grace to know Jesus in a personal way. Jesus is present in our midst and in each one of us.

Understanding the healing and comforting power of the Name of Jesus, the Jesus prayer is a simple prayer around this "Name that is above all other names...the Name by which we are saved" [Acts 4:12; Phil. 2:9-11]

The Jesus Prayer, or the Prayer of the Heart, centers on the Holy Name of Jesus itself. This simple prayer, prayed with faith and with perseverance, calls forth the Holy Spirit in our hearts, and, in time, gives birth to the experienced Presence of Jesus living in us.

Jesus calls us to make our home in Him; as He will make His home in us:

⁴ Abide in Me, and I in you. As the branch cannot bear fruit of itself, unless it abides in the vine, neither can you, unless you abide in Me.

⁵ "I am the vine, you are the branches. He who abides in Me, and I in him, bears much fruit; for without Me you can do nothing. [John 15:4-5]

Abiding in Christ is living out our union with Him in faith, baptism, love and obedience. The figure of the vine and the branches shows our union with Christ as intimate and real. We are a new people with Christ.

This simplest of prayers, prayed from time to time throughout the day will gradually lead us into the Presence of Jesus in our thoughts.

Focused wholly on Jesus, in time, this prayer will begin to strike roots in our heart, where its continued practice will ever deepen the reality of Jesus living in us – to heal us, to comfort us, and to strengthen us in our faith.

WHEN THE PRIEST ANNOUNCES

"Let us go forth in Peace." What does it mean?

"Let us go forth in peace" is the last commandment of the Liturgy.

What does it mean?

It means, surely, that the conclusion of the Divine Liturgy is not an 'end' but a beginning.

These words, "Let us go forth in peace," are not merely a comforting epilogue. They are a call to serve and bear witness.

In effect, those words, "Let us go forth in peace," mean the Liturgy is over, but the Liturgy after the Liturgy is about to begin.

This, then, is he aim of the Liturgy: that we should return to the world with the doors of our perceptions cleansed. We should return to the world after the Liturgy, seeing Christ in every human person, especially in those who suffer.

In the words of Father Alexander Schmemann, the Christian is the one who wherever he or she looks, everywhere sees Christ and rejoices in Him.

We are to go out, then, from the Liturgy and see Christ everywhere.
